

Still, a nice copy of STW's first book, a poetry collection praised by Arthur Quiller-Couch and A E Housman. Very good/ good

With printed dedication to "P. C. Buck", STW's long-time married lover and music teacher (of piano and organ), and Director of Music at Harrow, Dr. (later Sir) Percy Buck. Both were editors of *Tudor Church Music*. 1000 copies of *The Espalier* were printed.




A pleasing association copy, unusual with authorial signature.

With printed dedication "To Theo", her great friend T. F. Powys. 3000 copies were printed of the first edition.

Daphne Muir (née de Waal, 1896-1971) was a South African poet and author. Having wed Royden McIntosh Muir in 1923, she published five novels under her married name. Muir moved permanently to England in 1927, the same year as *Mr Fortune's Maggot* was published. She appears briefly in STW's (published) diary in 1929 (ed. Harman, 1995): the two authors dined and attended a concert together. STW presumably gifted Muir a copy of her second novel during this same period, with Muir valuing it enough to state ownership with her stern book-label.

A lovely copy of STW's re-telling of the Psyche and Cupid myth through the genre of historical romance, unusual with authorial signature.

With a printed dedication "To my mother who first told me a story". 3750 copies of the first edition were printed.


STW's protagonist with the true heart is Sukey Bond, orphan and slavey, hence the focal tea-kettle in Ray Garnett's vignette (see title page).

Ray Garnett (née Rachel Marshall, 1891-1940), illustrator and engraver, met STW through her husband, author and bookseller, David Garnett. STW became "an intimate friend of Ray's," but this pairing of author and illustrator was in fact prompted by Charles Prentice, David Garnett and STW's publisher at Chatto: "I shall be very glad to do a teapot and cups for the title page of *The True Heart*," Ray wrote to him, "If I do a woodcut, it must be a very fine one to go with the printing. Shall I draw several and show them to Sylvia to see if they are the right kind?" (cited in J. Lawrence Mitchell, 1981/2). The final woodcut was reproduced on the dust jacket, with the illustrator receiving three guineas and two copies of the novel for her work; this was a boon for Ray, who observed to Prentice, "I enjoyed reading the book immensely. I think I like it best of the three".



A special edition of 30 copies on hand-made paper was issued simultaneously. 'Elinor Barley' was later collected in *The Salutation* (1932).





(*Diaries*, 1994). With printed dedication to Arthur Machen, the author's uncle and supernatural novelist: "a renowned *bon viveur*, sharing with the heroine of *Opus* 7 an appreciation of gin" (Russell & Lawrence Mitchell).

Opus 7 was simultaneously published as no. 6 in Chatto's short-lived Dolphin Books Series, whose boards and jackets were designed by Bawden (see item below).





A solid copy of this important early experiment in contrast (rather than collaboration) by the two poets and lovers, which has been compared to Wordsworth's and Coleridge's *Lyrical Ballads*.

With a printed dedication "To Robert Frost," who apparently "found their poems disturbing" (Russell & Lawrence). First published in the US in 1933 by Viking, with Chatto & Windus bringing in US sheets for its own edition of 622 copies.

Comprising 109 untitled poems, 54 by Warner and 55 by Ackland, with the British edition featuring a key to the rear (see image to right) identifying authorship, to circumvent critical preoccupation with who wrote what. STW and VA observed that the collection is "both an

experiment in the presentation of poetry and a protest against the frame of mind which judges a poem by looking to see who wrote it." ('Note to Reader'). It is also a collection of love poems, "which vaunts [the women's] physical love, emotional commitment and the sheer creative joy each found in the other." (O'Callaghan, 2009).



Pauline, Lady Rumbold (born Pauline Tennant, 1927-2008) was a British actress, poet and socialite, who moved to Dorchester with her third husband, Sir Anthony Rumbold, 10th Baronet (1911-1983), where she was "at the centre of an extensive social life" (ODNB) – perhaps briefly overlapping with STW, who lived in Frome Vauchurch, eight miles north-west of Dorchester, until her death in 1978?





The book was revolutionary in encouraging women to celebrate their sexuality and included chapters on self-care, reproductive rights, sexual independence and 'Lesbian perspectives (by a group of socialist lesbians in London)'. 

A well-consulted copy of the first US edition of this classic feminist survival manual, which "broke the silence about rape in the US".


Subtitled, How to avoid entrapment and how to cope with rape physically and emotionally, Against Rape went through seven printings before its official publication date and was used in rape crisis centers and incorporated into both women's studies and self-defence courses.

Phillips and Rakusen included the title in their Bibliography for the 'Violence' chapter in *Our Bodies Ourselves*, noting: "Excellent, readable, with sound feminist analysis and practical advice." (see item above for our copy of the first Penguin edition).






A wonderful example of the controversial first Hamlyn paperback edition clad in the rare feminist-supplied 'counter-cover'.

Featuring Orbach's own choice of subtitle, 'A self help guide for compulsive eaters,' the countercover was "produced by a group of women who work as printers, booksellers and distributors" and who had been angered by Hamlyn's exploitative cover design (front flap). Taking things into their own hands, the women decided: "if they could produce their own cover, so can we" and highlighted: "In doing so we have received support and involvement from Susie Orbach." Readers are invited to join their protest by addressing complaints to Hamlyn Paperbacks, with the publisher's address provided.







A pleasing copy of the Winter 1985 issue of the long-running radical feminist magazine, featuring Cath Jackson's review of Susie Orbach's *Fat is a Feminist Issue* (see item 17 for our feminist-clad copy of the controversial first Hamlyn edition).

Trouble and Strife was an independent radical feminist magazine published in Britain between 1983 and 2002. Its masthead featured the following legend, outlining its political position: *"Trouble and Strife* is cockney rhyming slang for wife. We chose this name because it acknowledges the reality of conflict in relations between women and men. As radical

feminists, our politics come directly from this tension between men's power and women's resistance." This issue was collectively produced by Lynn Alderson, Dena Attar, Cath Jackson, Liz Kelly, Sophie Laws, Diana Leonard, Judy Stevens and Ruth Wallsgrove.




