

A distinguished political multi-association copy of this unusual collection of ten French revolutionary pamphlets from 1798/9 relating to the Coup of 30 Prairial Year VII and the Coup of 18 Fructidor, from the library of Joséphine de Beauharnais, with her Bibliothèque de la Malmaison stamp to the first half title and monogram to spine; later, from the library of French politician and editor of Voltaire Louis Nicolas Jean Joachim de Cayrol, with his signature and ex libris stamps, and, from 1861, from the library of French author and 'father of the Statue of Liberty' Édouard René de Laboulaye, with his ownership signatures, and finally, from the library of the British Conservative MP and celebrated Talleyrand biographer, Duff Cooper, with his (and his wife Diana Cooper's) Rex Whistler-designed ex libris. A splendid copy.

All ten pamphlets are unusual both in the trade and British research institutions: JiscLHD, for instance, locates three copies of Talleyrand's pamphlet in Britain and Ireland (BL, London Library & UoCambridge). The French minister and Napoleon's chief diplomat, Charles-Maurice de Talleyrand-Perigord (1754-1838) was appointed foreign minister in 1797 and, in the same year, was instrumental in assisting with the Coup of 18 Fructidor Year V (4.x.1797), which ousted two moderate and Royalist members of the Directory in favour of the Jacobins headed by Paul Barras. Two years later, the Coup of 30 Prairial Year VII (18.vi.1799, or the Revenge of the Councils) left anti-Jacobin Director Emmanuel-Joseph Sieyès as the dominant figure of the French government. The Directors Louis-Marie de La Révellière-Lépeaux and Philippe Antoine Merlin de Douai were forced to resign. The following month (July 1799) Talleyrand resigned from the Directory and published the first pamphlet collected here, with the others commenting on the two Coups and offering responses and defences from key figures.


PROVENANCE: Joséphine de Beauharnais (1763-1814; formerly Marie Josèphe Rose Tascher de La Pagerie;) purchased (for an exorbitant sum) the Château de Malmaison in 1799, three years after her marriage to Napoleon Bonaparte (and the publication year of many of the pamphlets collected here). She commissioned a library, whose books were signed (as here) at the heels of spines with an Empire-style monogram comprising the letters 'PB' for Pagerie-Bonaparte. The Bibliothèque de la Malmaison stamp was added during the sales of the library from May to July 1829.

Louis Nicolas Jean Joachim de Cayrol (1775-1860) was a French politician and historian, as well as Voltaire's editor. His two ex libris stamps read: 'Ex libris de Cayrol' and 'De Cayrol, Sous-intendant Militaire'.

Édouard René Lefèbvre de Laboulaye (1811-1883) was a French jurist, poet, author, anti-slavery activist and 'father of the Statue of Liberty'. In 1932, five years before he purchased this book from P. Goldschmidt & Co, Duff Cooper's celebrated biography of Talleyrand was issued by Jonathan Cape. Cooper included the French diplomat's pamphlet in his 'Bibliography and Notes,' under the 'Original Documents' he consulted. He evidently deemed it significant enough to add to his own library, with this copy.

A pleasing political association copy of Ramsay MacDonald's memoir of his wife Margaret, the social reformer and suffragist, affectionately inscribed in 1970 by their son Malcolm, almost certainly to "old friend" and fellow former MP, Thelma Cazalet-Keir.

Malcolm MacDonald (1901-1981) and Thelma Cazalet-Keir (1899-1989) both held office under Winston Churchill's wartime ministry: MacDonald was Minister of Health (1940-1) and High Commissioner to Canada (1941-1946), while Cazalet-Keir was MP for Islington East; she was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the

Ministry of Education under Churchill's caretaker government (ODNB). Thirty years later, in a very different political era, and only a year before he inscribed this copy "To Thelma," Cazalet-Keir sold her Kent home, Raspitt Hill plus 75 acres, "deliberately for much less than its true value, to an old friend, Malcolm MacDonald" (ODNB).

Cazalet-Keir was indeed "a kindred spirit of Margaret Ethel MacDonald": a feminist and Conservative MP, and from 1947, chair of the Equal Pay Campaign Committee; she "eventually saw the principle enshrined in legislation in 1970," the year of inscription. A keen supporter of both the Women's Engineering Society and the Fawcett Library, in 1964 she was president of the Fawcett Society.



A well-handled naval association copy of this popular C19th physics textbook, awarded to Shipwright Apprentice Charles Fowling for "his uniformly good conduct and progress in his studies during the Year 1871" and signed by the erstwhile Irish Arctic explorer, Sir Leopold McClintock, who served as the Admiral-Superintendent of Portsmouth Dockyard from April 1872 to May 1877. Sir (Francis) Leopold McClintock KCB FRS (1819–1907) was an Irish Arctic explorer and British naval officer, known for his discoveries in the Canadian Arctic Archipelago and his skill as a long-distance sledger. He led the McClintock Arctic expedition of 1857, a British effort (funded by Lady Franklin) on the steam yacht the *Fox*, to locate the remains of Captain John Franklin's expedition. The crew spent two years in the region and returned with the written memoranda of Franklin's death, the abandonment of the ships, and the fate of the party, with McClintock and crew awarded the Arctic medal in recognition. He published his account in *The Voyage of the Fox in the Arctic seas*: A narrative of the fate of Sir John Franklin and his companions (1859).






A pleasing association copy of this new, combined edition of George Meredith's first novel ("a work of genius, and of poetical genius", according to George Eliot), inscribed to Dorothy Frances Gordon, the daughter of his close friend and literary mentee, Alice Butcher (formerly Gordon), the author and promoter of domestic electricity; Meredith was fond of Dorothy too, with his (later) inscription entreating her "not to forget George Meredith" in early adulthood.

Alice Butcher (earlier Gordon, later styled Lady Danesfort; 1854-1929) met Meredith in 1867 on a visit to her cousin's home near Box Hill, Surrey as a teenager. He became "the chief inspiration of her life," taking an interest in her intellectual development and assisted, many years later, with her 1892 novel, *Eunice Anscombe* (ODNB). Butcher was considered by some to be Meredith's model for "the beautiful Tory" Cecilia Haskett in *Beauchamp's Career* (1874-5). Alice married her cousin from Surrey, the electrical engineer James Edward Henry Gordon (1852-1893), and played a significant role in "domesticating electricity" and encouraging its adoption in homes through titles like her 1891 *Decorative Electricity* (Gooday, 2014).


When the Gordons' daughter Dorothy was born in 1880, "Mr. Meredith took great interest in the child" and later wrote touchingly to Butcher, "Dorothy binds me more closely to my old friend. That is what love means." (Butcher, 1919). Just over twenty years later, Meredith gifted the young woman a clutch of his novels – presumably including this one – writing to her mother in 1903: "My dear Mrs. Butcher, – The little books by post herewith may do for Dorothy, if she cares for these stories. They are reprints in good type. Perhaps the mother may think [The tale of] Chloe [An Episode in the History of Beau Beamish] not suitable." (ibid).



A splendid familial presentation copy of the rare first edition of Manx revival poet Josephine Kermode's first poetry collection (and first outing under her *nom de plume*), inscribed, in the publication year, to her sister C M 'Cherill' Kermode and featuring a further poem 'Inasmuch' (not collected here) inscribed in the poet's hand.

Cushag – the Manx Gaelic for ragwort, the official flower of the Isle of Man – was the

familial nickname and *nom de plume* of the Ramsey-born poet and playwright Josephine Kermode (1852-1937). The daughter of a peripatetic antiquarian and clergyman and his second wife, Kermode's work is informed by Manx folklore, which, along with the Manx activist Sophia Morrison, she also collected. From 1908, when the second edition of *Poems* was issued, Kermode lived with her brother, P. M. C. Kermode, an historian famed for deciphering the Celtic-Norse crosses of the Island and later appointed the first Curator of the Manx Museum. Following her brother's death in 1932, the poet moved to Bournemouth with her sister, Caroline Matilda Cherill Kermode (c. 1861-1946), also known as Cherry.

An important figure in the Manx literary revival, following in the wake of her fellow poet T. E. Brown and the novelist Hall Caine, Kermode's poems and plays proved popular on the Island: three editions of *Poems by "Cushag"* had



appeared by 1911. Celebrated for her humour and lyricism, as well as her use of traditional Manx themes and dialect, her work was "laced with words and phrases in Manx Gaelic [... and...] was seen as a record in verse of a distillation of the spirit and beliefs of the Manx crofters in their scattered hamlets and lonely farmhouses".

This collection was also reviewed in English language publications, with the *Manchester Guardian* critic offering a challenge to readers: "The dialect verse, in which most of the poems are written, presents an almost insuperable obstacle to English readers, but if this difficulty can be surmounted, there is in the volume ample reward for the trouble involved".


A pleasing inscribed copy of Susan Miles' second collection of poems.

Under her pseudonym, Ursula Wyllie Roberts (1887-1975) published eight volumes of poetry and three novels, including her novel in verse, *Lettice Delmer* (1958). Roberts only using her given name for her 1911 polemic, *The Cause of Purity and Women's Suffrage*, published by the Church League for Women's Suffrage.

A lovely association copy of Llewelyn Powys' first solo book, a collection of short stories and sketches set in Africa and England, in the scarce primitivist modernist style dust jacket designed by Winold Reiss; the cover design was produced before Reiss' transformation to "a position supportive of projects of emancipation," which led to the artist playing an important role in developing the visual culture of the Harlem Renaissance (Kravagna, 2022).

The German-born artist and graphic designer Winold Reiss (1886-1953) had emigrated to the US in 1913. Two years after producing his design for the dust jacket and frontis of the Harcourt, Brace edition of *Ebony and Ivory*, he illustrated the special issue of *Survey Graphic* dedicated to the Harlem Renaissance, 'Harlem: Mecca of the New Negro,' and the expanded book, *The New Negro* (also 1925), edited by Alain Locke. He was Aaron Douglas' teacher and mentor.

Lloyd Emerson Siberell (1905-1968), "a railroad man by vocation and a literary man by avocation," was a prominent collector of Powysiana and "a constant voice championing the Powys cause for over thirty years" (Ankeny, 1996). His bookplate was designed by Mathias Noheimer, who went on to illustrate Hal Trovillion's edition of Llewelyn Powys' A Baker's Dozen, an edition guided by Siberell's hand.




and sketches set in Africa and England, owned by "his lady," Alyse Gregory, the editor of *The Dial*, which had originally carried two pieces collected here, 'A Sheepman's Diary' (April 1920) and 'Dead Matter in Africa' (March 1921).



Anglo-American woman of letters, Alyse Gregory (1884-1967) married Llewelyn Powys in New York in 1924, a year after *Ebony and Ivory's* publication(s). They had met in 1921, when Powys received an invitation to tea at Patchin Place in a hand "spider-like and intellectual," reminding him of "Oscar Wilde's handwriting in his letters to Lois Wilkinson". Gregory's home "was entirely different from anything I had seen elsewhere in New York," as was "the poise, the intellectual intensity, the freedom from preconceptions, as of a child uncontaminated by the world, of my grave, delicately ironic hostess" (Powys, 1927). Gregory resigned her editorship of *The Dial* and the couple relocated to Britain in 1925, where they lived near East Chaldon, Dorset, close to Powys' equally talented and creative siblings, Theodore, Katie and Gertrude.

The Harcourt Brace edition, with its striking b/w frontis by Winold Reiss (1886-1953), the German-born American artist and graphic designer, appeared shortly after the American Library Service edition of *Ebony and Ivory*.

A pre-eminent association copy of Leslie Paul's rare first collection of poetry (which he later disowned), inscribed in the year of publication to his parents, "with love"; two years earlier (at 20) he had marked the founding of the Woodcraft Folk, an educational movement for children and young people with strong pagan and anti-capitalist leanings, by reading the 'The Song of Creation', which opens *Pipes of Pan* and is "derived from Walt Whitman and Edward Carpenter, the writers I [Leslie Paul] had been thrilled to find were

speaking the golden tongue we most longed to hear" (Paul, 1951).

Dublin-born Leslie Allen Paul (1905-1985) was an Anglo-Irish author, youth movement founder and journalist. He won the Atlantic Award in Literature in 1946, on the commendation of T. S. Eliot, with whom he had recently worked to restore and memorialise the grave of the French philosopher and activist, Simone Weil (see #11).

Befitting for the publisher of this Woodcraft Folk-steeped collection, the firm C. W. Daniel published left-leaning titles and authors, as well as "a range of British high-thinkers and simple-lifers". Charles Daniel was prosecuted twice under the Defence of the Realm Act; the second time for publication of Rose Allatini/ A T Fitzroy's gripping pacifist novel of love between men, Despised and Rejected (1918).




A pleasing copy of Leslie Paul's unusual educational pamphlet, written during his short spell teaching at Ashridge College of Citizenship (1947-8), in which he sought "to set out the principal authorities on the Soviet Union and to suggest the logical order of reading and study"; Paul had visited the USSR in 1931 and published Co-Operation in the U.S.S.R. (1934).

First issued in April 1948 in the Ashridge Quarterly (1930-1948), the publication of Bonar Law Memorial College, Ashridge and affiliated groups. A training centre for the Conservative Party (1929-1954), the college sought to create both "Conservative Fabians," and provide a "College of Citizenship" for "the general education of the electorate", which is where Paul briefly taught.

Yeats in their Cuala Press Broadsides and their shared view "that poetry should be spoken to the sound of string instruments". A sometime correspondent of Vaughn Williams, Barnett was interested in English folk music.



A pleasing copy of Katherine Watson's first and only poetry collection, with a fond ALS and one-page uncollected poem ('Castelvecchio, Verona') laid in; the latter perhaps relating to her post-war pilgrimage by bicycle to Rome (recounted in the posthumously published *Pedallers to Rome* (2012)).

Katherine Watson (1918-2008) was an Oxfordshire-based Catholic poet and bookseller, whose early poetry was "frankly and openly imitative of [Gerald Manley] Hopkins" (Hecht, 1956). She served in the Women's Royal Naval Service in WWII, edited "the longest-running and most difficult literary competition in the world,"




Nemo's Almanac, from 1959 to 1970 (followed by John Fuller and then Alan Hollinghurst), opened Watson's Bookshop in Burford, Oxfordshire, in 1966 (the same year as her ALS), which she ran successfully until 1980. She was a peripheral member of John Bailey and Iris Murdoch's circle, having been in a relationship with Bayley in the early 1950s. From 1964 Watson lived with her companion, Pamela Redmayne. Despite publishing only a single volume in her lifetime, her papers, now held by the Bodleian, show that she continued to write poetry; indeed, her friend, biographer and literary executor, Carolyn King, edited and published Watson's *Collected Poems* in 2012.

Watson's fond ALS of 1966 gifts a copy of *The Source* to "My dear Anthony" as well as acknowledging his own unnamed work, which "gives [her] pleasure, satisfaction to live with: it is a real enrichment of my ambience". She closes her letter by wondering: "Are you finding it too cold to work?"

A smart copy of Pamela Frankau's own favourite of her novels, which interrogated grief and faith, affectionately and intriguingly inscribed in the year of publication, "For my very dear Wallace". The Bridge is dedicated "To M.W.: 'with ease and affection," Frankau's lover, the celebrated Anglo-American Shakespeare director, Margaret Webster. The novel also features a nod to a previous lover and her fellow ATS officer, Marjorie Vernon Whitefoord, in the masculine Valentine Brooks, who "looked like Charles the Second when she laughed; black curls, grape-bloom eyes and white teeth" and took "Linda into her arms with a man's embrace; he [David, the protagonist] thought that Linda rather liked it." Known as Vernon, Whitefoord sponsored Frankau's conversion to Roman Catholicism in 1942; she died only two years later.




